In the upcoming fiscal year, IHA will implement a variety of strategies to address the shortage of affordable housing as reflected in the below waiting list statistics and in the attached Statement of Housing Needs. IHA's strategies emanate from the Agency's 5-Year Plan goals and objectives and are aligned with HUD's strategic framework. They are also consistent with the City of Independences' Consolidated Plan and the State of Missouri Consolidated Plan.

Core strategies include: maximizing affordable housing opportunities through continuous program improvements and management efficiencies; leveraging additional resources to replace public housing units and implement mixed-finance, mixed-income redevelopment; and generating new housing opportunities by applying for additional vouchers should they become available - including special purpose vouchers for targeted groups such as the elderly, disabled, veterans, homeless and foster youth.

IHA plans to revise its preferences to include a local preference for applicants who live, work or attend educational or job training in Jackson County. Current preferences for Elderly or Disabled, Homeless, Veteran and Displaced by Natural Disaster will not be removed.

IHA will be reviewing its option to look for funding to renovate all three properties. Some OBR units may be merged and reclassified in both developments in AMP001, which includes 159 - 0BR units at Pleasant Heights, which is an 8-story building along with 2 - 0BR units at Hocker Heights, which is a family site. It is the intention of merging 2-0BR units together for the most part, but some are aligned beside a 1BR unit that will create additional 2BR units for this property. The current layout for Pleasant Heights is 176-0BR units; 56-1BR units; 9-2BR units. Any unit count reduction will be put in a Conversion Awaiting Transfer or other holding system such as Faircloth Limit and used in future acquisition or development.

IHA updated ADMIN plan to be compliant with Small Area Fair Market Rent (SAFMR) requirement. IHA plans to update ADMIN and ACOP policies to be compliant with Federal Regulation regarding changes in NSPIRE inspections, HOTMA provisions. Changes will be in place by October 2025

IHA updated Chapter 18 of the ACOP to allow for payment agreements for Security Deposits instead of requiring entire Security Deposit up-front. Security deposits are due and payable at the time of move-in. If an applicant is not able to pay the full security deposit (\$300), the applicant will be allowed to sign a payment agreement with the following terms: Initial payment of \$75 and monthly payments of \$25 for nine months for a total of \$300.

IHA has hired a full-time ROSS Coordinator and is trying to garner additional funding through an upcoming grant that will cover the position into the RAD Conversion.

IHA created an Internal Control Policy reflective of actual procedures and practices used to safeguard assets, mitigate risks, comply with applicable laws and regulations and meet established standards.

IHA updates the Flat Rent for LIPH and the Payment Standards yearly in accordance with the posted HUD Fair Market Rents. Small Area Fair Market Rents were implemented effective January 1, 2025 and new flat rents for LIPH which are at least 80% of HUD FMR were implemented effective January 1, 2025.
